

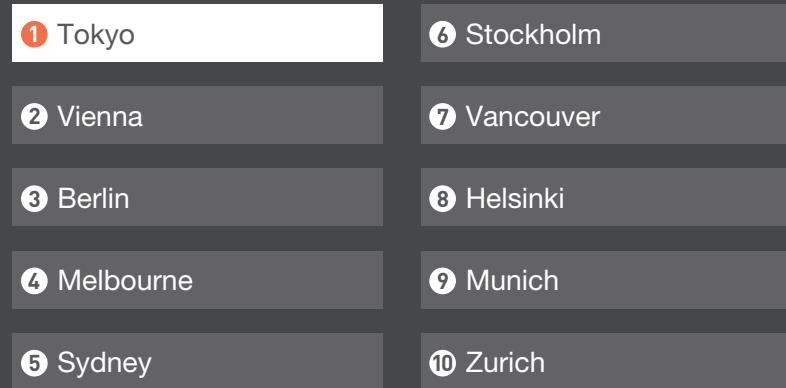

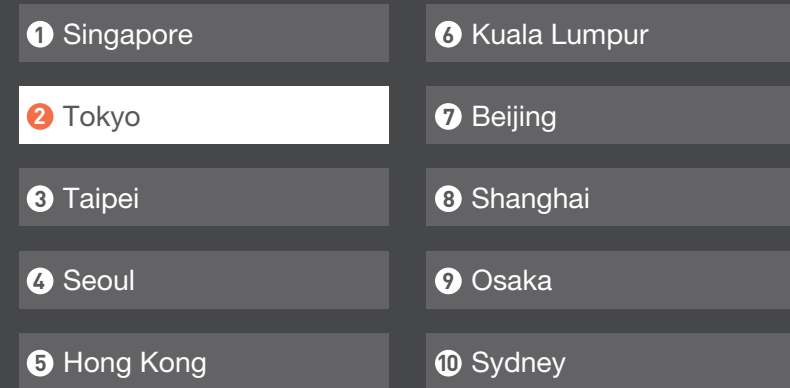

Of 163 cities in the Asia-Pacific region, Tokyo was ranked second. The city won praise for its high-quality infrastructure and strategy for foreign direct investment. Measures to address English-language communication will be needed in order to capture the top spot.



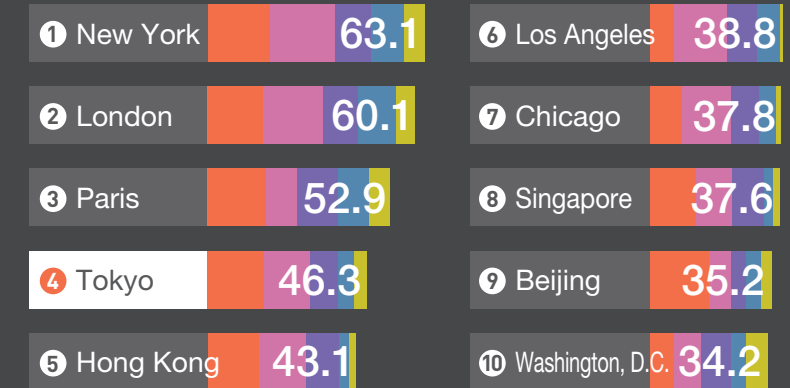

Ranked No. 4 on the Global Cities Index; Securing future human capital is a challenge

On the Global Cities Index 2015 announced by international consulting firm A.T. Kearney, Tokyo is ranked No. 4. In the human capital area, it was highly evaluated for, among others, having the highest percentage of university graduates or above in the population. In future potential it ranks No. 18, with views that the graying of the population will have a major impact on the economy.



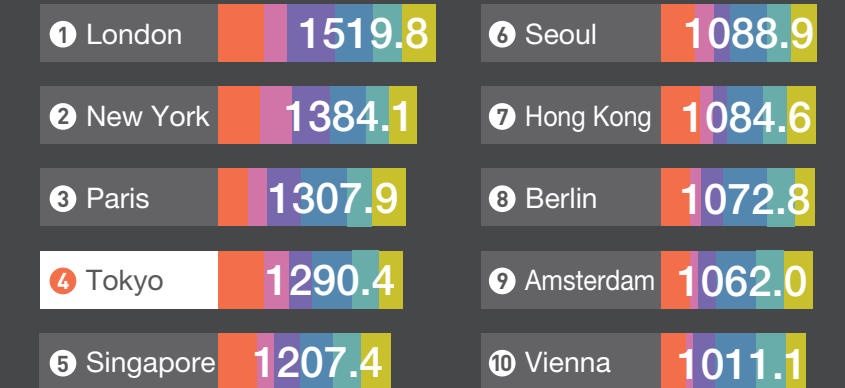
Business activity (30%) Human capital (30%) Information exchange (15%) Cultural experience (15%) Political engagement (10%) (2015)

No. 1 in economy; Further strides through Tokyo 2020

The Mori Memorial Foundation's Institute for Urban Strategies evaluates 40 world cities by six functions to determine their comprehensive power ranking. Tokyo was No. 4 in 2015 in the comprehensive ranking. It ranked No. 1 in Economy, and No. 5 in Cultural Interaction. The low ranking in Accessibility is expected to improve with the increase in flights in and out of Haneda Airport and urban development.
